Some questions for your reflection on today's service:

- Youth: How do we "glorify God in our bodies"? How do you manage your sexual energy? What are your hopes and expectations for sex?

- Older Adults: When and where is a safe place for older adults to talk together about the issues surrounding sexual expression as we age? (It seems to be a forgotten/forbidden topic in most conversations about aging).
