Description of “Moebius Strip” on display in the sanctuary:

As was said in church earlier, a Moebius strip is a two dimensional object with one side and one edge and is non-orientable. To make a representation of it, you can take a strip of paper, give one end a half twist, and glue the ends together. If you touch a spot and move your finger around the strip, your finger will end up on the "other" side of the paper at your original spot. If you slide your finger along the edge, you will reach every part of the edge. Now imagine that the strip is made of glass and lay a paper doll on it with the right hand waving at you. If you slide the doll once around the strip, you will see the doll waving at you with its left hand (this is what is meant by non-orientable).
